Annual Review

Leeds Asylum Seekers' Support Network was set up in 1999 to respond to the pressing unmet needs of refugees and asylum seekers living in Leeds.

Most of the people we work with have experienced acute isolation, mental health issues, language difficulties and immense uncertainty over their asylum claim.



Asylum seekers, refugees and other migrants will be safe, respected, supported and empowered to rebuild their lives free of persecution.

Our Mission

LASSN will meet the needs of refugees, asylum seekers, and other migrants in Leeds and raise awareness of the issues they face.

Our Objectives

LASSN wants asylum seekers, refugees, and other migrants to be:

SUPPORTED by EMPOWERED

by local people and relieved from hardship and distress;

to rebuild their lives, fulfil their potential, and have an influence;

ALLEGINATED and settled in their new environment in Leeds, and for Leeds to be a place where organisations, the public and policy makers collaborate with refugees to make Leeds a place of welcome and understanding.

How we work...

Respectfully with asylum seekers, refugees, and other migrants, acknowledging the significant contribution they make to LASSN, Leeds and the UK.

Informed by the experiences of asylum seekers, refugees, and other migrants to ensure we meet their needs.

To Empower asylum seekers, refugees and other migrants and engage the local Leeds community to become involved in this support.

In Partnership and collaboration with other organisations and service providers so that asylum seekers, refugees and other migrants access the most appropriate services.

With Volunteers whose time and enthusiasm are vital to our work with refugees, asylum seekers and other migrants.

Supported

373 asylum seekers and refugees received one to one support from LASSN. Including children and other dependents, LASSN supported a total of 672 people.

nights of accommodation were provided to the **37** Guests who stayed at Grace House, Eva's House and with Grace Hosts.



231 people volunteered with LASSN.

14% of volunteers describe themselves as refugees, asylum seekers or migrants, and supported our work in various ways: assisting with recruitment and selection; training volunteers; representing LASSN at conferences and strategic meetings; public speaking; interpreting and translating; organising trips and socials; making films and taking photos; cooking; publicising our work; and serving as Trustees.

Expowered

107 people were able to improve their social connections and their overall health and wellbeing through our work to connect asylum seekers, refugees and other migrants with mentors and befrienders.



All LASSN clients were offered phones, data, and credit to help them stay in touch and access support.

Integrated

All the people we work alongside were encouraged to find out more about life in the UK. Volunteers supported them to find their feet in Leeds and understand more about how Leeds works – visiting schools, universities, cultural activities, galleries, theatre performances, gardening, swimming, walking, cycling, visiting sporting fixtures, and contributing to arts projects.

218 people were supported to improve their confidence in speaking and writing English through our English at Home and Befriending projects.

201 posts on migrationpartnership.org.uk helped keep 22,000 people abreast of the changing face of asylum services in Leeds and beyond.



The <u>lassn.org.uk</u> website had more than 17,000 visitors, LASSN's Facebook page has over 3,000 likes and LASSN has over 2,100 Twitter followers.

Connecting Opportunities

This project empowers new migrants to enhance their English language skills, integrate, and access support.

Volunteers are paired with migrants, meeting weekly to foster a relationship, explore the city, and develop skills.

Our Tea & Talk group meets bi-weekly in various cafes in Leeds, allowing refugees and migrants to develop friendship groups, English language skills and a network of support.

This year, **29** volunteers supported **61** people seeking employment or education, **14** of whom found jobs or entered education.

96 Tea & Talk sessions were held throughout the year. The group also ventured on social and cultural trips to places like Temple Newsam, Calverley Hall, and the Corn Exchange.

Taking part in activities and fulfilling hobbies as a group has enabled participants to build confidence and created a safe space for cultural exchange.

Befriending

Befriending reduces isolation, improves well-being, and encourages integration and greater self-reliance among asylum seekers and refugees. Volunteers provide practical support to the people they are matched with: supporting people to access health and social care services, make stronger connections with community organisations, and make friends.

In the last year, **46** asylum seekers and refugees were matched with **40** volunteers who provided one-to-one support. Befriending enabled refugees and befrienders to learn more about Leeds and make greater social connections. Activities like picnics, theatre trips, and visits to sporting fixtures helped people to discover new aspects of life in Leeds and to widen their social circle.

Welcome & Connect

Towards the end of this year, we merged our Connecting Opportunities and Befriending projects into a new goal-focused volunteering project Welcome & Connect, where volunteers help refugees and asylum seekers connect to support services, educational opportunities, and cultural /leisure activities in Leeds.

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English at Home

Volunteer tutors match with refugee and asylum seeker learners who cannot attend mainstream English classes. Volunteers support learners to build their confidence in English and achieve goals they set for themselves.

This year, **91** tutors spent **2013** hours teaching English to **111** people. Among them, 56 successfully joined college courses or mainstream ESOL classes. After sessions, **95%** of learners said they felt more confident speaking English.

1:1 sessions enabled learners to pass UK Citizenship and driving tests, speak with teachers at parents' evenings, make GP appointments, attend bakery courses, support other refugees and asylum seekers arriving in the area and much more!

Learners were also connected with volunteering opportunities to practice their English in community settings.

25 training and support volunteer sessions ensured volunteers had a place to share skills, learn from one another, and reflect on how they help people learn.

Our Voices

"When I first met Amara* she had no English language and was very new to the country. Amara's determination in weekly sessions has meant that, within just six months, Amara can now write her name, recognise much of the alphabet – and her vocabulary is increasing daily. It is especially admirable given she has more than five young children and a very busy household.

I am so proud of what Amara has learnt and hope to continue to see her flourish!"

Grace Hosting

The Grace Hosting Project provides accommodation to asylum seekers in Leeds who are not entitled to any other accommodation. Coping with this stress, building an asylum case, and worrying about loved ones requires remarkable emotional resilience.

Volunteer Hosts offer their spare rooms to Guests and offer them support. Grace House and Eva House are shared houses where Guests can get respite from destitution and reconnect with support around their asylum claim.

This year, **37 Guests** were accommodated for a total of **5189 nights**, the equivalent of over **14 years**. 19 people stayed with 6 Hosts and 18 people stayed at Grace or Eva's House.

Increased financial support was given to Hosts and Guests through the winter months to help with an increase in cost of living and utility bills. Guests have been encouraged to participate in wider group activities to ease isolation and levels of stress - including a gardening group, trips to the theatre and rugby.

A generous donation enabled us to gift monthly gym passes to Guests which had multiple benefits from having a reason to leave the house, gain strength and improve sleeping patterns.

"Staying with Cara for 10 months gave peace to my mind, knowing I was going to sleep in the same place. I was making a 20-year application, I had so much paperwork, so much stress I needed this place to help me to focus. She was friendly, I could talk to her, she even trusted me with a key to her house...she never judged me".

Ukrainian Hosting Support Project

With support from Leeds City Council and Leeds Community Foundation, LASSN started its Ukraine Hosting Support Project in November 2022.

The project aims to make hosting an enjoyable and positive experience by helping Hosts meet, learn from one another, and find extra support for their Ukrainian Guests.

Regular groups were set up around the city, and a series of information sessions for Hosts were set up covering topics like supporting people with trauma or finding rented accommodation.

In response to an increase of new migrants in Leeds, our website <u>newtoleeds.org</u> was updated to ensure that Ukrainian people were welcomed with the right information in their own language. The website is a resource for all new migrants living in Leeds and reached over 16,000 people in the last year.

"The group has made a huge difference with our hosting experience. At the point of joining, we were in desperate need of being able to discuss our experiences with people that simply understood. I can honestly say that without the support of Anna and the group, our hosting experience would have broken down months ago".

Information & Awareness

Providing information and raising awareness of issues around asylum and refuge are central to LASSN's mission: tackling prejudice, encouraging understanding, and fostering interaction and integration within the local community.


22,000 people looked at migrationpartnership.org.uk - a multi-author blog focused on local asylum, refuge, and migration.

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WHAT WE

Our partners

Partnership and collaborations are at the heart of all LASSN's work. Here are some of the organisations we work with most closely.



We work closely with <u>Positive Action for</u> <u>Refugees and Asylum Seekers (PAFRAS)</u> and British Red Cross who provide support and advice for clients in Grace Hosting.

Our support to destitute people informs our membership of the



<u>No Accommodation Network</u> and <u>Asylum Matters</u> - who both influence regional and national policy on homelessness, asylum seekers and refugees. We also provide free Wi-Fi access to people staying in <u>WYDAN</u> and <u>LEDAS</u> accommodation.



We are members of Forum <u>Central/Volition</u> – who represent third sector organisations in Leeds with an interest in mental health, wellbeing, and <u>Voluntary Action Leeds</u>.

We are active members of <u>Leeds Migration Partnership</u> and contribute to the Strategy,



Operations, and Information strands. We started (and still maintain) the blog which acts as a weekly bulletin for individuals and organisations who support asylum seekers refugees and other migrants in Leeds.



We are a <u>Connecting</u>

Opportunities partner. Connecting Opportunities works with new migrants to develop their skills and opportunities to work and be part of the local community. WHO WE WORK WITH

SOLUCIAR Digital Inclusion: As well

as supplying devices and SIM cards for free – we continue to fund a digital inclusion project with <u>Leeds Refugee Forum</u> (LRF). This provides clients with devices and training on how to use them.

Solidaritech.com continue to provide portable technology free of charge. This year LRF was able to create a lending library to supply tablets to asylum seekers and other people living in temporary accommodation.



We are working in partnership with Leeds GATE, Basis Yorkshire, and Yorkshire MESMAC and with Asylum Seekers, Gypsies and Travellers, Sex Workers, and Trans+ people to tackle health inequalities. Adaptive Action workshops have been facilitated throughout the year, bringing together community voices and those in positions of power to gain shared understanding of what is happening and move towards action.

leeds hardship fund

LASSN works in partnership we work in partnership with PAFRAS, British Red Cross, Meeting Point, Solace and RETAS to raise and distribute funds to refugees experiencing homelessness and destitution.


LASSN Finances 2022-23
